



She has been a columnist for *Money*, *Glamour*, and *Redbook* magazines, and a contributor to the *New York Times*, the *Wall Street Journal*, *Reader's Digest*, and *O, The Oprah Magazine*. Her writing appears on *The Huffington Post*, SheKnows.com, and Money.com. Ms. Kobliner has been a regular contributor to MSNBC as well as PRI's *The Takeaway* and APM's *Marketplace*.
